IT'S YOUR LAST CHANCE TO clean shovels, spades, hoes and other equipment. Use a five gallon container, add water and a tablespoon of liquid detergent to help the clods release from the blade. When the soil is removed, dry and sharpen. Sharpen garden tools with a broad file. Tools sharpened on a power grinder heat and lose their temper. Such metal is less spring-like and more brittle. Wipe new motor oil on the blades.

#### IN MEMORY OF OTTO H. ERICKSON

A kind and gentle man, a loving husband and father, an excellent gardener and a good friend to those of us in MGCM who knew and loved him has gone to his reward.

I first knew him in 1944 when we both won awards in the Victory Garden Competition that year. Otto and his wife had a "Gem" of a flower garden at their home (I think Thora was as much responsible for its perfection as he.) and rented a plot where he demonstrated his prowess as an award winning Vegetable gardener.

It was not until 1954, when I joined MGCM that I really got to know Otto. He had moved to a couple acres of raw woods situated between two lakes near North St. Paul, where he and Thora had cleared and built a "Park" of lawns, flower gardens and woods paths that was a delight to visit.

Otto was a long time employee of N.S.P.--an engineer in the power plant--and commuted daily; yet he still found time for his many varied interests. He was well read, an avid bird watcher who had catalogued many rare visitors to his woods and feeders. Otto had the ability to make and keep friends who will treasure their memory of him.

For some time the Board of Directors has been discussing how to increase participation in the Club's annual Flower and Vegetable Show at the Arboretum in August. With a small degree of fluctuation, we've had roughly the same number of exhibits and exhibitors over the last few years. The number of exhibits has been adequate, but a few men have supplied most of those numbers by entering many items each. Then there are a few, such as yours truly, who bring a few items to "fill up the benches". The fact remains that less than a quarter of our members enter the show, with just a few more attending to help out with the show or view the exhibits. That's not very good representation for a club of our size and ability.

Some members of the Board and the Show committee thought the long drive to the Arboretum might be inhibiting entries, so we arranged an "in-town" drop off point for people who didn't want to make the long trip. Others thought educating members might help and arranged to have successful exhibitors give short demonstrations at monthly meetings on how to show various classes of exhibits. We still had about the same number of entries.

I'm convinced that once a member gets his feet wet by showing a few items, he'll realize that his efforts stand up pretty darn well in relation to the others. Who knows, he might even win a ribbon or two in the process. If we can convince a few more men that it's not all that tough to prepare flowers and vegetables to show and that judges are not supercritical old so-and-sos, we could be on our way to making this show the club's premier public event.

So we're going to try coercion! Our regular June meeting at the church will feature a mini-show. Vegetables won't be ready yet, of course, but we'll be able to have flowers that don't bloom at the right time for the August show. We'll have as many classes as we have flowers for, and they'll be judged and ribbons will be awarded. Afterward, we'll have the judges explain to us all why they did what they did; what separates a prize winner from an also ran. Everyone should learn a great deal that they can apply to the later summer event.

Now the coercion. Every member who attends the June meeting will be expected to bring one or, at most, two entries. In return he'll get a dollar off the price of his meal. Start planning now to have at least one item ready to show.

It's not too early to begin planning for the big August show, either. Committee Co-Chairmen Phil Peterson and Dale Durst have announced that the bell pepper and the zinnia will be the national award vegetable and flower. These are plants that many of us grow, so let's make sure that no one walks off with a National Award ribbon without having to beat some stiff competition.

It's spring. It's a time of rejuvenation. Buds are breaking. New growth is starting. What better time for this slogan:

Before I retired I was in charge of an agency office in the Minneapolis Grain Exchange Building. At that time I had an elderly man, who was blind, visit our office to have his mail read to him. Mike Kooreny was an immigrant to this country from eastern Europe. At the age of 2 he had smallpox which blinded him for life. Mike made his living by tuning pianos. His sense of direction and memory was uncanny. One time when he came to our office he asked me if we had some roses on our counter. I asked him, how he knew that. In reply, he told me he was taken to the Fragrance Garden a number of times. He also said he could tell the difference in smell between all flowers.

So, Members, lets do a good job on the garden again.
