### CLARENCE F. "KNOBBY" KNOBLAUCH

1904 - 1988

Clarence passed away on November 17. He was preceded in death by his wife Catherine and his son Francis. He was survived by two sons and two daughters plus numerous grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Although raised in the Cannon Falls area he came to Minneapolis to work for 40 years as a pipe fitter for the Milwaukee Railroad. For many years he also served as Treasurer-Manager of the Milwaukee Road credit union.

He became a member of the Men's Garden Club of Minneapolis in 1974. He was proud to be named a member of the group. With his lovely wife, Catherine, he hosted numerous tours of their beautiful, well manicured garden of over 250 rose plants. Both were very happy when in 1979 he won the Lehman Trophy for his efforts.

Clarence was an honorary member of the Minnesota Rose Society. His favorite roses were the same as those of his beloved Catherine. They raised the exquisite pink blend hybrid tea "Tiffany" and the beautiful pink miniature rose "Cupcake". At one time Clarence had the finest climbers in the area as well as some outstanding tree rose specimens. The American Rose Society named him an Honorary Life Consulting Rosarian.

Though gradually advanced age and numerous health problems slowed him up his interest in roses never flagged. Recently his son John discovered recorded in his father's meticulously kept diary this observation.

# M. Denesuk, 72; played in Minnesota Orchestra

Michael Denesuk, 72, a viola player with the Minnesota Orchestra from 1953 to 1982, died of a heart attack Nov. 10 in Osage, Iowa.

Denesuk, a native of Peabody, Mass., received a master's degree in music from Tufts University in Boston and played with the U.S. Navy band from 1940 to 1946.

He performed with the San Antonio . (Texas) Symphony Orchestra from 1950 to 1952, and in 1953 was invited by conductor Antal Dorati to join the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra

"At his own request he sat at the fifth chair because he had had a heart condition for years," said his wife, Patricia.

Denesuk toured the Middle East and Mexico with the orchestra before retiring in 1982. He also taught privately

"He had made a hobby of his study of nutrition ... and had a huge library of books on nutrition," Patricia Denesuk said. Fellow members of the orchestra called him "Vitamin Mike," she said.

Denesuk and his wife moved from southeast Minneapolis to Mitchell, Iowa, in 1986, where he was a member of the Osage Rotary Club. Besides his wife, he is survived by two nieces.

A memorial service will be held at 3 p.m. Sunday at the First Congregational Church, 500 8th Av. SE., Minneapolis. Memorials to the Minnesota Orchestra or the Denesuk Scholarship Fund at the Osage Rotary Club are suggested.

I'll make a few mistakes but with our mutual concern and friendship for each other, I know we'll have a great year.

I'd like to suggest the following goals for MGCM in 1989:

1. Bring the Center for the Blind into full partnership with MGCM in the Fragrance Garden Project. In the past few years few people at the Center have known that the Garden is for their use. Some did not know that it existed. Kent Petterson and others have met with people at the Center to express our concerns. He and his committee are exploring new ways to make the garden experience more meaningful for the partially sighted or the blind.

The Center for the Blind has a special radio station for their listening. Our own Kent Petterson was interviewed on tape for their station. He expressed concern about the need for more blind people to use the garden. This will be aired in January. We are hopeful this may help in promoting use of the 19th and Aldrich site for limited vision and blind people.

- 2. Revive the Mentor Gardener Program. Some members have called other members about a question related to their gardening. Some may have felt reluctant to make a call. Now you may choose, or be assigned, a garden advocate that will help you in your gardening experience. This open approach should provide greater ease in contacting a certain person to help with your garden. Let each of us open our knowledge and experience to this project.
- Expand friendships in our club. All of us enjoy seeing people we know at our meetings--I would encourage each of us to invite an unknown person to sit with us at our monthly dinners. Extend and expand your friendships so all feel welcome.
- 4. Allow most of meeting time for top flight programs. Through the suggestion of Herb Neby, we started the mini-sessions. For the most part they have been well received. They will be continued this year. A certain amount of business is necessary in any club. I will try to keep the meetings moving at a good pace and make them as short as possible without cutting off necessary discussion.
- 5. Actively recruit new members. We should take in 10-15 new members each year if we are to keep our membership at the current level. Duane Reynolds has developed a brochure advertising our club. These brochures will be placed at Garden Centers next year. This approach helps but does not replace the better method of personal contact. I would encourage each of us to invite his gardening friends to join this great club we have.

Have you wondered about the rock in the logo? Each of us has a bit of history with us. The old hitching post has been at our family homestead

since 1900. It was in St. Cloud until 1920, then my parents moved it to their cabin at Mille Lacs Lake. I brought it to my home when the cabin was sold in 1984. It now stands proudly in my front yard.

To me a beautiful garden is like a great symphony. Seeds are planted in soil and expand as does a great musical work or art. Anticipation is up front--always there for endless possibilities--

--color--with splashes of bright tones.

--cool colors--with suggestion of ethereal moods--leading to

--climax--high tones with a complement of full garden exhilarating experiences.

Good luck on making your garden a great symphony.

## 1989 OFFICER AND DIRECTOR PROFILES

DUANE JOHNSON, PRESIDENT: Duane is an "all out" club member with a record of helping the club in many areas. He has served on committees including Arbor Day, Community Garden, Christmas Party, Flower and Vegetable Show and the Plant Auction. A member for 7 years, Duane lives in south Minneapolis. where he grows many annuals and perennials. He now hopes to be accepted in the next class of Master Beginning as Gardeners.

an Elementary School teacher, Duane has headed the Special Education Department at Field Elementary School in south Minneapolis for 20 years. We look forward to his leadership this year.

KENT PETTERSON, VICE PRESIDENT: Kent is our member who joined in 1986 and won the National Award for his carrots that first year at the Flower and Vegetable Show. He shows vegetables regularly and has served on the Show committee and chaired the Community Garden Committee last year. Kent has a special interest in herbs and has a dryer for preparation of herbs for home use. He also dries plants for arrangements, either by hanging up to dry or with silica sand. Last year, he received the Minneapolis Blooming Boulevard Award for Front Yards. Kent is an Estimator for Laughlin Electric Company.

GENE ACKLAND, SECRETARY: Gene will be long remembered for his contribution to the NGCA Convention last year by handling all registrations on his computer. He was able to produce any type of list or information upon request. Gene is Senior Technical Specialist for Dayton-Hudson in the Electronic Data Processing Department. ## **GERANIUM TREE:**

Want to grow a geranium tree? It's easy!! Start with a rooted cutting from March to May. Pot eventually into a 6-inch pot. Do not pinch main shoot. Instead, keep the single unpinched stem tied to a stake inserted in the pot. Remove all side shoots and buds as they appear. Do not remove leaves. When the central stem has reached  $2\frac{1}{2}$  to  $3\frac{1}{2}$  feet, pinch tip and allow 3 to 5 side branches to grow from the upper end. When each side branch is 4 to 6 inches in length, pinch and repeat with subsequent branches until a good head is formed.
