TOPIC: "The Arboretum in the 1980's"

The Minnesota Landscape Arboretum was established and grew to its current size under the direction of Dr. Leon Snyder. It concentrated on the needs of the "small gardener" and became accessible even to the disabled and elderly under the leadership of Dr. Frances DeVos. Now in 1986 with the University's "Commitment to Excellence" the emphasis will shift again. Peter Olin, one of the premier landscape architects in the country, is focusing the direction of the arboretum towards research and teaching. He will preview the exciting new programs which are starting and give an update on the current status of the extensive research efforts already underway at the arboretum.

Glenn Ray Shares Gardening Philosophy at October MGCM Meeting

Glenn Ray is Executive Secretary of the Minnesota State Horticultural Society and long-time member of MGCM. In the distant past, he was a teacher of the Russian language, but left education to pursue professionally his first love – gardening.

Glenn told his audience that he thinks there are but three kinds of people in the world:

- 1. most people, who never notice their surroundings
- 2. a smaller group, who do what is necessary to keep their yards in order
- 3. the very few devoted gardeners who put their souls into it.

He noted that these devoted few are ones who, if asked to name the 10 best days of their lives, would say 7 had been spent in the garden. Gardening touches all the senses. Gardeners hear the sounds of nature. They both smell and feel the soil. In fact, Glenn said, given the nature of modern farming, gardeners are about the only people left who actually work the soil.

According to Glenn Ray, there are many reason given by people for gardening. Some say they grow vegetables to save money, but we all know how silly that is. Some want to improve the value of their property or upgrade the neighborhood. Some egotists say they want to grow the biggest tomatoe. Others say they garden to keep busy, but there are lots of other ways to stay busy. Glenn says the best explanation is a simple one -- "Because I like it."

Gardening is to Glenn the best escape from the tension and cares of the world. He noted that there is little alcoholism or drug addiction among gardeners. It's because gardening is their addiction. Statistically, gardeners live longer. They also live in one place longer than most people. And, they tend to have conservative habits — conservative as in conservation, that is.

Glenn argues that a truely educated person is one who has learned to think, to read, to walk or run (to move properly), and to grow their own food and flower. He says gardening is one of our oldest art forms — with the themes of garden and paradise woven through literature, painting, architecture, landscape, music and the like beginning with the "garden of Eden."

To illustrate his points, Glenn showed a series of slides which he has taken. Some of the pictures have appeared in the pages of the Minnesota Horticulturist.

They showed both the good and bad in our attitudes and actions in regard to the landscape, and amply demonstrated the difference between the three types of people Glenn had described at the beginning of his talk. I think those who attended this meeting left resolved to be the third type of gardener, which he described as a gardener with "soul."

HINTS OF THE MONTH:

- 1. With the winter months just ahead and the gas heat coming on and off what better way to detect the presence of unburned gas in the air in your home than a pot of Irish Moss, a carnation plant or a dwarf tomato plant. All are susceptible to gas. If you have a pot of Irish Moss and its tiny leaves blacken on healthy stems have your gas appliances checked. The tomato plant indication is discoloration and downward turning leaves. The carnation will tell of a leak in a room even as cut flowers. 
