




OCTOBER MEETING REPORT by Andy Marlow

The main speaker at the October meeting of MGCM was Bill Hull, General Chairman of the 1988 Men's Garden Clubs of America convention hosted by our Club last July. Bill delivered a final report on activities and presented certificates of appreciation to those men and their wives who made the convention such a tremendous success. Space doesn't allow me to include a complete list of those honored (nor could I write fast enough to get them all written down), but those of us who attended the convention know who they are and are extremely grateful for their contributions to this effort.

The evening's mini-session was presented by Dr. Robert C. Olson, who is an unabashed hosta fanatic. His fanaticism began with a visit to Bob Savory's greenhouse and a look at a specimen of the variegated Montana hosta. He bought a plant with but a single leaf, which is now some 46" in diameter.

Bob's collection has grown in number, as well as size, from that humble beginning. He says a common mistake with hostas, one he made at first, is to plant too many too close. They both look better and grow better spread out a bit. The setting they grow in is also important. Try setting them off with color from shade tolerant flowering plants such as impatiens, begonias, etc.

Hostas can be grown from quite small divisions (which is what you usually get when you buy them). Larger divisions (usually from friends and other collectors) tend to do better and get large faster. Divisions with at least three growing "fingerlets" are best. Bob says you can use a long-handled bulb planter to pluck out a good sized division. For larger divisions, use two spading forks to force the plant apart at the roots -- keep one part and the give the other away. The best time for dividing is early spring, when the shoots are first showing, but be careful, as stepping on an emerging shoot can doom the plant for the season.

Hostas are tough, hardy plants that can survive most garden conditions. They do like lots of organic material in the soil, and, when you consider they can stay in the same location for decades, be generous with peat moss, well composted leaves or well rotted manure. Bob recommends buying the latter in bags at the garden center. They also need adequate moisture. Their edges will turn brown from lack of water.


Olson fertilizes his plants in early spring, again, about the time the shoots first begin to show. He sprinkles 10-10-10 around the plant like salt and pepper on food. He says to be careful, though, not to get the fertilizer on the leaves. It can burn them. Bob says hostas may not really need fertilizer, but he feels better if he puts some down.

The only pest that bothers the hosta is the slug. In fact, Bob calls the slug a hostas "mortal enemy." He uses some slug killer he gets from his mother-inlaw in San Francisco, either Corry's Slug and Snail Death or Deadline. Other preparations work, he says, but not nearly as well.

He concluded his presentation with slides of some typical and some outstanding varieties. Bob says trying to pick a favorite is like trying to pick a favorite child -- something he just doesn't want to do.

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MENTOR GARDENERS

Our dictionary defines a mentor as a "wise and faithful counselor". This is the type of person we had in mind in proposing a mentor gardening program among our members. Now that our truly successful 1988 MGCA Convention is behind us, we'd like to suggest that the club get back to the basics of gardening. What better way than through a program that can get our members together in their own gardens?

Some member may modestly not consider himself "a wise and faithful counselor" but one shouldn't underestimate what he may have to offer other members. Experiencing successes and failures is a great teacher. Maybe you can help someone avoid some of those failures.

Do not confuse this program with the Master Gardener Program, for which training is required to participate. No outside training will be offered or required and no minimum hours of service are necessary. What will be needed is an interest in sharing, a willingness to help other members to improve their gardening.

Here's how we envision this program implementation and operation:

- 1 When you renew your membership for 1989, take a moment to indicate if you are interested in being listed as a mentor. Along with this, indicate the areas in which you have experience.

- 4 Those of you who will be working with a mentor have a chance to enrich your gardening. This program is for you. Mentors cannot mentor without someone seeking their help.

COMMITTEES

MEN'S GARDEN CLUB OF MINNEAPOLIS

Arbor Day Committee:

To select and arrange the planting of a tree on Arbor Day in the metropolitan area.

Auditing Committee:

To annually audit all records of the club - guide record keeping procedure to Treasurer - give annual club audit.

Awards/Trophies Committee:

To monitor and account for all awards/trophies issued by the club - to establish criteria for awards/trophies - all engraving and to make presentations at the appropriate event and/or at designated award/trophy meetings.

Bronze Medal Committee:

Composed of the current recipient as chairman and the last previous four recipients. To award the Bronze Medal at the Christmas party to a member in recognition of outstanding service during the year.

Calendar Committee:

To work with membership in the sales of MGCA calendars and their distribution.

<u>Christmas</u> <u>Party</u> <u>Committee</u>: To plan and make all arrangements for the club's annual gala event - the grand finale of the year the Christmas Party.

Flower/Vegetable Show Committee:

To plan, promote, supervise and make all necessary arrangements for the club's annual flower/vegetable show.

Historian:

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To write, maintain records of all events, activites, functions of the Men's Garden Club of Minneapolis, to include community activities, functions and events worthy of recording.

Hospitality Committee:

To greet new and old members at each club meeting making everyone welcome - to issue and collect name tags - special handling of guests - assist treasurer in collection and tallies of dinner and other monies - issuance of meal tickets, maintain reservations/attendance roster - to offer/arrange assistance in the form of transportation of members with those problems - coordinate functions with the Membership Committee - maintain a telephone committee to inform members of meetings and special events.

Membership Committee:

To assist new members in attendance at the meetings, introduction, hosting. To assist club board to gain and maintain membership - promote the club and all its activities.

Nominating Committee:

Composed of the present club President and the past five club Presidents who will solicit and select from within the club membership individuals to fill the offices of President, Vice President (program chairman), Secretary, Treasurer and four Directors. Every attempt will be made to upgrade the current membership of the Board and replace two directors each year.

Photography Committee:

To plan, promote and solicit progressional photos of member's flower and vegetable gardess, landscape projects, decks and patios and other gardening interests - to include club projects and special tours as to have available for presentation to club membership in the course of monthly scheduled meetings.

Raffle Committee:

Conduct raffles at monthly meeting - awarding garden oriented prizes.

Spring Plant Auction Committee:

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To plan, solicit and obtain plants and materials; select the site and stage the production of the annual spring plant sale and auction as a fund raising activity for club projects and obligations.

Sunshine Committee:

To keep in touch with members who are hospitalized or ill - send appropriate get well cards signed by members - sending of plants/flowers as directed - to use hospitality calling committee for emergency notifications.

Tour Committee:

To select gardens for summer tours; visit ahead of time the gardens to be toured; to make arrangements for transportation and all special requirements for the tour.
