Speaker: Dr. Harold Pellett

Coordinator, Center for Hardy Landscape Plants in Chanhassen, Minnesota

Dr. Pellett is best known for developing of the "Lights" series of winter hardy azaleas. The Center represents a coordinated effort involving many institutions and individuals throughout the United States and Canada. Its mission is to support and encourage the breeding and development of quality landscape plants tolerant of environmental and biological stresses. The Center has recently supported research trips to China and Russia to acquire seeds of plants to be used in future breeding efforts.

Dr. Pellet will talk about some current successes and projects that are now going on at the Center. A number of "new" plants developed through the efforts of Dr. Pellet and his colleagues were made available to MGCM members at our annual Plant Sale and Auction on May 10th.



I had not been to an Arbor Day planting for a couple of years until April 30. I joined a crew of 15 or so to plant 20 clumps of Heritage River Birch along the west shore of Birch Pond in Theodore Wirth Park. It was a bit wet, but fortified with hot chocolate and high rubber boots supplied by Mary Lerman of the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board, we made short work of it.

After the planting, Mary led us along a path west from the parking lot nearest Birch Pond to the Quaking Bog. The bog features a floating tamarack island, called Mariana's Isle, from which Eloise Butler gathered a number of the acid-loving plants for her Wildflower Garden.

The island is surrounded by a moat. Nearly 200 tamarack trees make their home on the island, along with sphagnum moss and carnivorous plants such as Pitcher Plants and Sundews. Normally you would have to travel quite a ways north is experience this unique environment. It's a real treat to have it so near by.

Access to the bog and island is being improved. On April 22, Earth Day, students from Lake Country Montessori School began installing a boardwalk onto and around the floating island. This follows a major effort by Park Board staff to eliminate European Buckthorn from the area and restore the native flora. Incidentally, funds for the boardwalk project come from a grant by the Legislative Commission on Minnesota Resources, which is funded by proceeds from the Minnesota State Lottery. So all those dollars you've been investing in Gopher 5 are doing some good after all.







Correction

In last month's article on exhibiting vegetables, the late Dr. Orrin Turnquist advised removing the stems from beans before exhibiting. That article was written a number of years ago and Mel Anderson, one of MGCM's certified flower and vegetable judges, called to inform your editor (who should actually have known better) that a 1/ 2 inch or so of stem should be left on each bean. The stems should be trimmed so they are of uniform length.

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
