



Get them at the September MGCM Pinner meeting! A panel of selected M&CM members who are also Master Gardeners will discuss the summer's problems and respond to your questions.







Some Sun – and a Sun Dial – Belong in Your Garden

Time, the change in the length of the day and the apparent change in the positions of the sun, moon and stars with the seasons have long been of practical and intellectual interest to humans.

The changes are complex, consisting of overlapping cycles of various periods that are not readily apparent. It is thought that at least part of the purpose of Stonehenge (which predates recorded history by thousands of years) was to serve as a rather sophisticated astronomical observatory.

Sun dials were the earliest attempts to measure the hours in a day. They may predate recorded history, too. Isaiah, chapter 28, may be the first written reference to a sun dial.

The time shown on a sun dial is called "apparent time." Clock time is called "mean time." The difference between the two is called the "equation of time." It is given in most almanacs and some calendars as "clock slow" and "clock fast."

Clock time, or "mean time," is the average of all solar days in a year.

The difference in times will be a few minutes in a day – sometimes a little ahead, sometimes a little behind. The maximum is about 16 minutes for a few days in November.

Each mile change in longitude (east/west) means about five seconds change in apparent time at middle latitudes. For us about a 14 mile change in location east to west will result in a one-minute change in apparent time.

Sun dials have long been a important feature of garden and landscape architecture, particularly for more formal gardens. In years past, no formal garden would have been considered complete without a sun dial and gazing ball.

Perhaps we should be more formal (although Leon wasn't a formal man) and call him Dr. Leon C. Snyder, head of the Department of Horticulture at the University of Minnesota

Many of you knew Leon because he was very active in MGCM. He had been a member since 1951, after having been nominated for membership by Archie Flack. When he filed out his application for MGCM membership, it is interesting that he listed his occupation as educator — which, of course, he was.

He educated us in many ways about horticulture, always able to respond to questions and quick and willing to discuss new introductions, whether from his own department or elsewhere. I can't begin to list all the new varieties introduced under his auspices, but they were many. He made a huge impact on Horticulture and agriculture.

Honors came his way easily and deservedly. For example, I well remember bestowing on him the Gold Medal of the Men's Garden Clubs of America when I was a past-president of that organization. It was for outstanding leadership in horticulture.

Many of us remember Leon at the Club Flower and Vegetable Shows at the old Park Board Greenhouse, at the University of Minnesota apple breeding farm and at the Arboretum, which he so ably led for many years.

He was a fine president of our club, presiding and leading with verve and ability. We owe him a lot. Yes, if you never had a chance to know Leon Snyder, you missed a fine man.
