PRESIDENT''S REPORT

The **Rum River Park District Seed Harvest** will begin on August 17 and continue on other Tuesdays and Saturdays in August, September and October. Volunteers are needed.

VICE-PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Since none of our current MGCM members joined the club in 1979, there will be no 25th Anniversary Celebration this year.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The minutes of the June Board Meeting were approved with one correction:

TREASURER'S REPORT

Tickets sold for the Biennial Garden Tour were 393 as compared to 465 in 2002. However the estimated profit from the tour is about \$3600 which is more than the profit in 2002. With the \$1300+ already in the Scholarship Fund, about \$5000 will be available for scholarships.

Since it is hard to document members' attendance at the Public Garden Tour, Dave Johnson would like to consider dropping this item from the requirements for the Perfect Attendance Award.

MEMBERSHIP SECRETARY'S REPORT Two people have submitted their application for membership to MGCM. They are Bruce Gilman and Pamela Wagner. The motion to accept them as new members was seconded and passed.

Don Stuewe has some suggestions for increasing club membership:

- a. Frequent reminders to members to invite guests to our monthly club meetings.
- b. Use the club as a plant resource for members planting new gardens. A question asking members to list plants they would be willing to contribute will be listed on renewal applications for the coming year so that a list of available plants, potential donors can be kept on file.

<u>Garden Spray</u>: Chuck Carlson will caucus his committee and present a recommendation as to how the Spray will he handled at the September Board Meeting.

August FFF: The committee has suggested that the names of contributing members be eligible for a gift certificate drawing.

Edible Flowers

Edible flowers have been used in the culinary arts for flavor and garnish for hundreds of years. Early reports indicate that the Romans used flowers in cooking, as did the Chinese, Middle Eastern and Indian cultures. They are again popular in North America and Europe. Many edible flowers are high in vitamin C and/or vitamin A, along with other essential nutrients.

Ten Rules of Edible Flowers

- 1. Eat flowers only when you are positive they are edible. If uncertain, consult a good reference book.
- 2. Do not use non-edible flowers for garnish on plates. Many people believe that anything on the plate can be eaten.
- 3. Do not use pesticides on edible crops.
- 4. Do not eat flowers from florists, nurseries or garden centers.
- 5. Do not eat flowers picked from the side of the road (possible herbicide use).
- 6. Remove pistils and stamens from flowers before eating. Eat only the flower petals for most flowers, daylilies are an exception where unopened flower pods can be eaten.
- 7. Different flavors occur in plants when grown in different locations because of soil types, fertilization, and culture. Environmental conditions play a big role as well.
- 8. Introduce flowers into your diet in small quantities one species at a time. Too much may cause problems for your digestive system.
- 9. If you have allergies, introduce edible flowers gradually, as they may aggravate some allergies.
- Enjoy the different flavors and colors that edible flowers add to many foods.



2005 All **America Selections**

The All American Selection(AAS) winners for 2005 have been announced. The flowers are; Gaillardia aristata 'Arizona Sun', Vinca 'First Kiss Blueberry' and Zinnia F1 'Magellan Coral'. The vegetables are: Eggplant F1 'Fairy Tale', Tomato F1 'Sugary' and Winter Squash F1 'Bonbon'.

Gaillardia 'Arizona Sun'

This is a compact plant, 8 to 10 inches tall spreading to 10 to 12 inches. It is a perennial but will flower the first year.

Vinca 'First Kiss Blueberry

This is the first blue flowered Catharanthus rosea. the flower is a violet blue with large 2 inch bloom. It is heat and drought tolerant about 11 inches tall with a spread of 16 inches and even makes a good container plant.

Zinnia 'Magellan Coral'

This is a zinnia with radiant blooms that are fully double 5 to 6 inch across. It also blooms a bit earlier than normal (6 to 9 weeks from sowing). It is about 16 inches high with a spread of about 18 inches. It is adaptable to containers.

Eggplant 'Fairy Tale'

This is a petite plant with miniature eggplants. The fruit will have a wonderful appearance and a luscious taste. The elongated oval can be used when small or large in about 50 days and is recommended for marinating or grilling whole.

Tomato 'Sugary'

the name says it, with a sugar content 9.5% higher than most others. The fruit is produced in clusters, with a distinct oval shape and a high yield. A new standard for cherry

sized tomatoes. It can be pruned to contain growth.

Winter Squash 'Bonbon'

This Cucurbita maxima squash will provide the grower with a smaller habit earliness and excellent eating qualities. Fruit will be available in 81 days which is a bit earlier that other winter squash. A sweet flavor hence the name 'Bonbon
