The following is a list of the awards given at the Holiday club party and a bit of history of the awards.

The first four awards are for the FFF Show. You might ask what does FFF stand for? At one time we were looking to have an upgrade on the show. It was called the Flower Show but it was more than that. It is a show that shows flowers, vegetables and Photos. To give it flair we decided to call it the Food, Flowers & Fotos Show. That's Photos spelled with an F. There are Four Trophies involved in the show.

Blackbourn Trophy

This is a trophy that is a memorial to Albert R Blackbourn. He was a Publisher of business–record books. It started being awarded in 1962.

This is awarded to the member who accumulates the most points in the flower competition at the FFF Show. This year it is awarded to Mary Maynard. This is the 9th time she has won this award. It really shows her dedication to the FFF show. I know she won't quit showing but she wants someone else to bring in a lot of winning entries so she doesn't have to carry this home every December.

The Foley trophy is a memorial to Tom Foley a long time member of the club This Trophy is awarded to the member who accumulates the most points in the vegetable competition at the FFF Show. The first year this was awarded was 1963

Smith Trophy

The Smith Trophy was in memorial to Robert L. Smith. Robert was the brother of Russ Smith who died suddenly in late 1985 at age 49. Andy Marlow was President at the time and the board decided it would go to the best first time exhibitor at the Flower and Vegetable Show. They used memorial money people sent to the club in Robert's name to purchase the trophy. The first award winner was Kent Petterson in 1986. The trophy this year is awarded to the best first time exhibitor who accumulated the most points at the FFF Show.

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Photo Award

In 1963 Lee Gillian gave this trophy to the club because he felt that the photographers needed to be to be recognized for their efforts. It is awarded to the competitor who accumulates the most points in photography competitions at the FFF Show. A little history about this award is that there was one person, Henry Orfield, who was such a good photographer that he was awarded the trophy 6 times.

Lehman Trophy

The trophy was provided by and named for Dick Lehman, Kak Koopmans' late father. Ruth and E.C. ("Dick") Lehman started a business in Faribault selling plants from their home garden. In 1934 they added greenhouses and started mail order sales of hardy perennials. Dick was an outstanding peony breeder and also provided a market for garden chrysanthemums introduced by the University of Minnesota's breeding program. The first time it was awarded was 1962

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Outstanding Service Medal

I am pleased to speak on behalf of last year's Outstanding Service medal winner, Archie Caple, who is unable to be with us tonight.

The responsibility to determine this award requires the previous five years' winners to evaluate the activities of all club members who are involved in the various garden club projects and services. The committee consists of Bob Livingston, Roger Koopmans, Stanley Crist, Archie Caple and me. We accepted this opportunity very seriously.

Our selection is an individual who has been an active member for more than 20 years and has served very generously with giving time, energy and enthusiasm. He has great knowledge of roses, annuals, perennials and vegetables. He is also noted for starting geraniums from cuttings. His extensive knowledge also includes making maple syrup from his own trees on his land in northern Minnesota.

This year's awardee has also been active in the Club's Plant Auction Committee since joining the club in 1986. He has often chaired this committee. Each year he has actively secured plants to be auctioned, requested donations from members, enthusiastically encouraged bidding, and helped secure funds for the club's activities. He has also been a member of the Fragrance Garden Committee and his garden has often been on the summer garden tour. He received the Lehman Trophy in 1991 for the outstanding garden on the tour that year. If the award could be given more than once he would be eligible. He has also entered beautiful specimens in our club's annual Flower, Food and Foto show.

The City of Brooklyn Park has a program to recognize residents for their gardening efforts for neighborhood beautification. Both our awardee and his wife received first place joint recognition for their participation in city wide summer blossom programs.

Within the Men's Garden Club the awardee has served as member of several other committees, a member of the Board of Directors, Vice President in 1995 and President in 1996, and he continues

to be a friend and mentor for all who recognize his broad knowledge of gardening. He is also a Master Gardener, an achievement level of only 14 members of our club.

His quiet demeanor is even more appreciated as you get to know him and feel his enthusiastic support and willingness to help others in their quest for more enjoyable gardening.

It gives me great pleasure to present this year's Outstanding Service Award to an individual who has given outstanding, sustained service to the Club for many years BOB STEPAN.
