Saturday, August 7, 1-4:30 pm is our MGCM member garden tour and catered picnic dinner. This is a self guided tour but I suggest that you plan to visit Larry and Randi Larson's gardens last because they are hosting the catered picnic after the tour. (Park in Larry's driveway if space is available.) The picnic begins at 5pm. The cost of the tour and picnic dinner is \$15. Following are brief descriptions of the member gardens on tour this year. These descriptions are intended to "pique your curiosity" as there isn't room to include all the interesting features of each garden.

Mary Maynard (4375 Dart Ave., St Louis Park) At Mary's garden, you will see that she lives up to her "Lazy Gardener" nickname. The front yard features perennials and hosta in the boulevard and borders, along with dahlias, zinnias, Russian Sage, Joe Pye, rudbeckia and salvias. The back yard features wide borders with hosta, daylilies, roses, dahlias and an assortment of other annuals and perennials along with tomatoes and peppers growing in the shade (mostly).

The back yard is accentuated by a large white pine and a "Golden Curls" willow.

Ann Le Flem (6606 Scandia Rd, Edina)
The lot of Ann LeFLem's home is 135' by 92' which allows for surprises as it is not possible to see all of the gardens at one glance. She has an intimate backyard with roses and a wide variety of plants. Gardens for sun, shade and semi shade surround the walkways. A gated fence and perennials make a narrow backyard secluded. Outside the gated area Ann has several beds with many clematis, perennials and roses. A cottage garden in her front yard allows for season long bloom.

Bob Olson (2840 Glenhurst Ave., St Louis Park)
Bob Olson's garden has been revised — again, since
the last club visit. This time by necessity when an
addition was put on the back of the house and existing
plantings (plus a couple of trees) were destroyed in the
process. Now there is considerably more sun and with
it colorful sun loving perennials and annuals and fewer
hosta which may be a blessing in disguise. There are
still lots of hosta, a few common, some unusual and
others (especially those from Japan) unique. They are
bigger and grow alongside shade tolerant companion

plants in clusters that make attractive groupings. It was a surprise to us to see how much sun some hosta not only tolerate but will thrive in. In a few spots lilies, hosta, daisies and petunias grow side-by-side.


Andy Marlow (10700 Minnetonka Blvd, Hopkins) Andy Marlow and wife Phyllis Stromberg moved from their previous home in Minneapolis because they had run out of room for more gardens. Despite living in their current home 31 years, they haven't come close to running out of room. Their acre and a quarter lot is surrounded by woods and contains only half an acre of lawns and gardens. Six major garden beds dot the property, with little pockets of ferns and other forestfriendly plants tucked into the woods. Gardening is still a challenge, especially fighting off the critters. They have had up to 13 deer at a time in their yard. It's a shady property, so hosta (Phyllis claims Andy is a hostaholic), ferns and other shade-loving perennials dominate. As the tree canopy has changed (Dutch elm disease), a few sun-loving plants including hardy roses have crept in, and replacement trees have been planted. Many specimen plants came from MGCM auctions, including a Kazakhstan birch, 'Northern Sun' forsythia, a pre-release 'Honeycrisp' apple and a now 30-year-old Star Magnolia.

Larry and Randi Larson (15225 Wild Wings, Minnetonka)

Larry and Randi Larson's gardens features about 40 dahlias, most of them grown in the back yard which also has about 50 perennials in three different gardens. There also are two vegetable container gardens with corn, wax beans, carrots, peas and tomatoes. Larry's "tall" garden features very tall plants including some grasses. The front yard has about 50 perennials including a very nice perennial Hibiscus, pampas grasses, hosta, a beautiful Japanese maple and many colorful annuals. About 20 self-planted pots featuring some very unusual plants including a castor bean are located in the front yard.

You are also invited to come inside the downstairs and take a look at Larry's collectables including records, a juke box, autographs, movie posters, steins and a den filled with sports collectables.

Then, narrow down your best digital photos—or get your prints digitized—and send no more than 20 by Email or memory device to Chuck or Lloyd by the end of July. Our judges this year will have several weeks to look at them and make their decisions. Back by popular demand: we will make prints of winners and present at least one print photoboard for your viewing pleasure, in addition to a digitized show.

For those members who want the public to judge, select two prints and send them to Chuck or Lloyd by the same deadline. Those will be selected by ballot at the Flower, Food and Foto show on August 21 and 22. Bring your friends and neighbors and vote wisely. Enjoy the whole 3F show. The first place winner of the People's Choice gets a \$50 gift certificate.

Categories in the juried show that always attract large numbers of entrants include the annuals, potted plants and perennials. Those with fewer entrants include wildflowers in the wild, members' gardens, and educational or manipulated photos. Many of the juried photos were taken with creative composition or in faraway locations. The People's Choice seems to go more toward Minnesota scenes and colorful, standard subjects. Maybe you can break the mold this year. We look forward to seeing your best efforts in our now mature, 18-year-old contest.
