

HOPE today's children grow up feeling good about flowers and butterflies and birds?
LEARN about youth garden clubs that offer children and young people a chance to dig and plant and grow.

PROMOTE the garden club's activity program encouraging young people to be curious about nature's mysteries and careful how they are used.

Educational Programs for 2011 and Beyond By Kay Wolfe, Vice- President & VP of Programs

MGCM's educational programs are some of the most important of all club events. Our programs are vital to not only our own learning as gardeners, but also are key to retaining our membership and recruiting new people. Finding good speakers and planning substantive learning experiences are essential to MGCM's survival as a quality garden club.

With the goal of providing quality programs, I asked five club members to help me create a plan for future club meetings. The volunteers that met last April were Lynda Carlson, Elizabeth Hamilton, Bob Livingston, Tim Malooly, and Jason Rathe. This committee noted that: MGCM has a wealth of knowledgeable gardeners—and suggested we "mine our experts". They suggested we make every meeting a learning experience—the whole meeting. They envisioned educational discussion during social hour and dinner. They noted that we need to educate members along the whole spectrum of gardening expertise. They wondered if we are furnishing our members with what they want?

Here are the program ideas for 2011. These ideas are not yet implemented plans—so anyone can still have input!

February, 2011 and March 2011

- 1. Permaculture: How to get the most production out of any piece of land. Speaker from the U.?
- 2. March: New Trends. Industry Updates. Speaker from Bailey's?

June 2011

Possible 'open garden' evening: Visit Jerry & Lee Shannon's garden and the unusual plants they have propogated. Additional stop: Tour of Kent Petterson's book store and shop garden. Need to find a dinner spot.

Fall: Sept., Oct. & Nov. 2011

1. Tangletown Gardens? Need to brainstorm with them—what do they do best? Design with foliage; creative use of hardscape; small and unusual trees. Can we visit there?



- 2. Bachman's? What is new in the nursery business? Might they give a tour and have dinner in Heritage Room?
- 3. A talk on MN & it's ag/hort history of the state fair and politicians. Need to make a contact.

MGCM needs to build a strong, on-going Program Committee. The group of five met as a one-time brainstorming task force and created a plan of possible program ideas. We need members to implement the plan. If necessary, the plan can be modified. 2012 program plans also need to be made. Please join in and help.

In the past the VP of Programs found speakers, and often the topics picked were those of interest to the VP—and maybe not to the rest of the club. The club expects the VP to accept their position in November, and set up interesting speakers for the very next year—an impossible timeline. I think this expectation of the VP is really detrimental to the club. How can we have someone do programs for one year, and then move on and take their skills and ideas with them? What kind of continuity do we get from this? Quality programs take thought and planning, and we may want more from good programs than sitting and being "talked to". Interactive programs and touring interesting facilities take some effort to plan. Let's put together a strong program committee that can lead us into the future. The Vice-President has an administrative job to do.

We need members to plan good programs. I suggest we all take a turn at planning a program. This is our club, and every member needs to be involved in making and keeping MGCM a quality garden club! The 2010 Photo Contest Overview

The entries have been turned in and the judging is completed. There were 232 entries from 20 entrants. Five judges spent Saturday Aug 14 and selected the winners of the 2010 contest. We had two new people who entered the contest and one of our new members, Gary DeGrand received the most points in the contest. He edged out Denice Rust by one point.

I believe all of the judges were impressed with the photos entered. One judge made these comments; "Overall I was quite impressed with the quality of the entries. Photos were carefully selected and not sent in "just to enter something". There were some categories where there were so many good entries it was tough to choose a winner (so we had at least one tie for first place). Some of the photos rose to the level of art, not just a depiction of reality".

During the judging, I kept track of the comments made during the process. There were many good comments but I was more interested in those that were used to eliminate the entries for awards. Some of my photos received some of these comments also and I learned from it. Paying attention to the comments I hope to become a better photographer. Below is a composite of these comments. I hope they help you also.

Comments from judges when judging the photos. Photos were eliminated or given a lower rating for the following reasons.

- * Dark areas draw attention away from the subject
- * Flowers with butterflies should be put in the Misc. category
- * Focus is fuzzy/Subject is not in focus
- * The photo is in the wrong category (class) or didn't meet the category definition
- * The background is too busy, thus taking away from the subject
- * The photo should have been taken closer to the subject
- * A second subject takes away from the main subject
- * Fences or other objects are a distraction
- * The subject is too centered (use the rule of thirds)
- * Specks, holes or pollen on the flower draws one away from the subject
- * Too many rain/water drops take attention away from the subject
- * The wrong name for the photo
- * Color looks faded or is the wrong shade
- * Objects in the foreground are a distraction
- * Name tags or dates in the photo are a distraction Turn off the date using the camera functions. There is no need to add a date to the image. Digital cameras automatically record this information on the memory card for later use.
