## **January Program**

Growing Better Trees and Shrubs without Soil: Gravel Bed Nurseries and Superior Root Systems

### Gary Johnson, U of M Extension Professor of Urban and Community Forestry

So, you thought you knew everything about growing trees and shrubs? Would you even consider that woody plants produced or grown in nurseries using nothing more than pea stone and water would have superior root systems and higher transplant survival rates than field or container-grown plants? Get ready to be introduced to gravel bed nurseries, no soil or fertilizers and planting bare-rooted trees and shrubs in the autumn...in Minnesota...with better results than spring planting. It's something that can be set up on a patio, or in a full-scale nursery production area. Check out the U of M Urban Forestry web site at www.trees.umn.edu, and get introduced to the gospel of gravel.

Speaker: Gary Johnson has been with the University of Minnesota, Department of Forest Resources since 1992. As Professor of Urban and Community Forestry, his research has included tree production, best planting practices, tree failure in storm events, and impacts of construction and development activities on tree and urban forest health. ## MGCM Awards Three \$500 Scholarships in 2010

Each year since 1992 the club has awarded scholarships, now totaling over \$50,000, to students of horticulture in Minnesota. The scholarship program was established in honor of our 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary year as a club. Each year we have generously given to young people who aspire to careers in horticulture. This year three students were given \$500.00 aid scholarships.

With the scholarship fund balance hovering in the low hundreds of dollars at the beginning of 2010, the club and public tour committee led by Denise Rust raised enough funds to assure we could go ahead with awards this year. In addition, due a wonderful donation of \$1000.00 by club recording secretary Jan Johnson, we were assured of continuity of scholarships until the next public tour which has been our primary source of scholarship funds. On behalf of the scholarship committee, I would like to thank Jan for her donation and the entire club for their continued support of this program.

At the club Christmas Party, two of the three recipients were introduced to the audience, but I would like to describe each for you. Those of us on the committee that get to read these wonderful applications each year feel each of these young people will represent themselves well in the future.

**Kristine Neu** is from Pelican Rapids, Minnesota and attends the University of Minnesota Crookston. She expects to graduate in May of 2012 with a triple major degree in Production Horticulture, Environmental Landscaping and Urban Forestry plus a degree in communication.
