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Notes from the Prez:

As I write this note, the holidays are behind us, the New Year has begun, and my mail box has been inundated with seed and nursery catalogs. Winter (this year) may just be getting started in earnest, but it is not too early to start thinking about this year's garden. It is time especially to decide if we will be starting our own plants indoors or buying them in the spring. There are pros and cons to each option.

Growing your own gives you the opportunity to satisfy your gardening bug sooner. You can save money, and grow more interesting selections (not commonly available in garden centers). I have been growing my own seedlings for many years and I still get I thrill when I see those first seeds sprouting. The smaller the seed, the more miraculous it seems. Of course, there is also the gardener bragging rights that come with growing your own, especially the more exotic and difficult ones.

On the other hand, growing your own plant requires an investment in time, space, and lights, not to mention all the dirt that is potentially tracked around your house. It can be difficult to find a responsible individual to care for "your babies" while you go off on a spring break vacation; and don't even get me started on the topic of "damping off". Those trying it for the first time should be warned that it can be addicting. It starts innocently with few trays of tomatoes in a sunny window, and before you know it, you have enough lights in your basement/garage to illuminate the Metrodome and you are calling Bachman's to see if they are willing to purchase a few truckloads of your surplus seedlings and cuttings. Someone should really do a study of this phenomenon to finally answer that proverbial question: "How many light bulbs does it take to change a gardener?"

As I get older, I increasingly live my life according to the philosophy "when given a choice, take both". For example, when offered a choice of strawberry cheesecake or chocolate hazelnut torte for dessert, say "yes, I'd like a small piece of each please". So, Last year when faced with the choice of purchasing or growing tomato plants, I chose both. The purchased ones were much bigger and were off to a fast start once planted. They yielded the first tomatoes. My home grown plants eventually caught up and provided the bulk of my harvest. The combination provided a long harvest season and exceptional variety, so I plan to do it again this year. The same goes for my bedding annuals. I grow some (selected favorites) and purchase the remainder.

Now, the whole discussion above leads naturally into a shameless plug for the MGCM annual plant auction in May. As usual, this event will include an opportunity to pre-order flats and pots of annuals. These have consistently been of the highest quality in all the years that I have purchased them. The country market will feature a wide variety of annuals and perennials (including tomatoes). If you have excess annuals that you grew yourself, bring them along and donate them to the sale. Of course, the main event is the auction of larger and more unique items. Remember, that this is the major source of funds for the operation the club. Without the success of the plant sale, dues would have to be much higher, or we would have to cut back on programs and activities. The plant auction committee puts in literally hundreds hours of effort to make this happen. So as you are starting to think about your 2012 garden, please include items from the plant auction in your plans. Invite your friends, relatives, and neighbors to come. If they tell you that they would come, but they always get their plants at XYZ, remind them that they can do both.

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MGCM Member Survey News

This is the second of five articles sharing the results of the MGCM membership survey with members. The first article in last month's *Garden Spray* dealt with demographics. This article deals with why people join, what we might do to grow, the controversy of a name change and members' views on meeting format.

The Survey Committee (Don Untiedt, Andy Marlow, and Gary De Grande) will be reviewing all the results at the February Board meeting and will make recommendations for the Board to consider appropriate action.

Why are you a member of the MGCM?

Members join to socialize (86%) and learn (89%) from other gardeners as well as share skills (55%) and tour each other's gardens (61%). Serving the community was less important (45%).


Name Change

In response to the question of whether the name should be changed to more accurately reflect who we are, 43% felt the name should be changed, 29% felt it should not be changed and 28% were neutral.

Growing MGCM

Members felt that more efforts should be made to publicize meetings, speakers and our activities (78%) and more should be done to encourage members to bring

in new members (65%). Fewer felt that incentives to bring in new members would be useful (28%). Some (41%) felt that more should be done to recognize and welcome visitors and new members.

Meetings

Most members (80%) say they attended 4-6 meetings last year. Three-quarters of members also prefer to keep the current format and cost. Most also felt the choice of speakers was good.

A majority also felt the April Macy's/Bachman's flower show should continue, although there was a significant number who were neutral.

Survey Comments

Although most of the comments reflected a satisfaction with the status quo, there were several interesting suggestions:

- Be friendlier to people you don't know
- Pair up new-old members to help with computer training
- Provide Lyndale Park gardeners with work vests to help advertise MGCM
- A major membership effort is needed to strengthen our future
- It can be intimidating to try to socialize as a new member when so many people in the club have been in it so long and are old friends
- Start a Facebook page (Ed's note: There is a Facebook page for MGCM)
- Great club but lacks an influx of new members/ideas.
- We know who we are but outsiders who see the name may be discouraged from attending that first meeting if they aren't men living in Minneapolis.
- Need to help new members feel part of the club and get involved.
- More publicity needed.
- Revive the gardening table topics to encourage garden talk during dinner rather than just social time.

Next month we'll look at members' opinions on garden tours and scholarships.
