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Notes from the Prez:

As you read the March Spray, the arrival of spring is just around the corner. As I was writing this article (on Feb 19), it felt like spring was already here; 50 degrees and sunny. I took the opportunity to do some tree trimming in my yard and get a head start on spring chores. In any case, the actual arrival of spring will be welcome. March was the first month of the year for the ancient Romans, so happy New Year again. This always seemed more logical to me than starting the New Year in the dead of winter. March is named for Mars, the god of war. As a historical aside, most of the other months were also named after Roman gods, with a few exceptions. July and August were named for the Caesars (but recall that March 15th, the "Ides of March", was not so great for Julius). September, October, November, and December were basically just called by their number (7 through 10 respectively, with March as month #1). So part of our Roman legacy is to have 4 months that were never formally named, and now are not even correctly numbered.

In my January article, I introduced the theme of Growing Together. I'm pleased with all the positive activity so far. Our club year is off to a great start. The officers and directors are settling into their roles. Several committees are hard at work already. I want to again highlight the Plant Auction committee, which is busy putting together the final touches on this important May event. Our first two club meetings have had excellent speakers and good attendance. Both speakers commented on how much fun we have at our club meetings. This is good. It will be easier to attract and retain members if our meetings are fun. I was pleased to see guests at both meetings with some new members joining at

our Feb meeting (yeah!). I expect the March meeting to be excellent also (topic of Shade Gardening); so come and invite guests. As my trees get bigger each year, shade gardening is no longer optional. Vice President Sandra Abraham has been working hard to finalize program details for the rest of this year. However, it no longer reflects our current membership and is a possible barrier to recruiting new members. I'm not intending to push for a name change this year but I do want to continue the conversation. We've already floated the idea of just dropping "Men's" from our name (The Garden Club of Minneapolis or the Minneapolis Garden club), given that we primarily meet in Minneapolis even if we don't all live here. There have been frequent suggestions of names that maintain our same initials "MGCM" (how about "Metro Gardeners Congregating Monthly"). I think that we will need to discover our new name before we will be ready to let go of our old name. Until then, let's honor our heritage by continuing to make this a great gardening club.

March Program: Shade Gardening with Shirley Mah Kooyman (Continued from Page 1)

Shade-loving plants can be the most beautiful in the garden and some of us get so hooked that we actually wish to grow more plants that prefer shade. A side benefit is that while the sun is beating down at temperatures of over 80-90 degrees it is much more comfortable gardening in the shady part of your garden.

The key to gardening in the shade is to know what varieties grow and thrive in the shade. Shirley will not only address what grows in the shade, but also how to grow them in the shade. What special soil, drainage, and fertilizers are needed for shade gardening? What types of shade are there and what is the difference gardening in moist shade versus dry shade? How does one determine what types of shade one has to work with in your garden? Most of all, how does one design an interesting and appealing shady space which will offer more than just "The Wearing of the Green"?



Shirley is a botanist with a specialty in taxonomy (plant names and identification). She worked at the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum for 25 years and was the Adult Education Manager for two decades. She has presented other programs for the MGCM as recently as last September when she delivered a delightful talk on "Moonlight Gardening".



2012 FFF Featured Flower: Rudbeckia

This year's featured flower at the Flower, Food and Foto Show is Rudbeckia. Rudbeckias (all 23 species in the genus Asteraceae) are native to North America. Commonly called black-eyed-susans or coneflowers (though not the same family as Echinacea or Ratibida), they grow well in full sun. We are probably most familiar with the garden staple (and excellent show specimen) Rudbeckia hirta 'Goldsturm', which is perennial in our area. There are also several very nice varieties that are grown as annuals or short-lived perennials here, such as 'Irish Eyes' and 'Prairie Sun'.

There are entry classes for both perennial and annual Rudbeckias at the FFF Show. Judges will select the best entry from both classes for a special ribbon. Both the annual and perennial entries should consist of three blooms of a single variety.

Our plant sale pre-order form includes three Rudbeckia varieties in 4-inch pots: 'Autumn Colors', 'Irish Eyes' and 'Indian Summer'. We'll probably have a few of these in the Plant Sale Country Store as well. Why not plan to bring a few entries to the August show?

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
MGCM Member Survey News

This is the third in a series of articles describing the results of the survey of MGCM members conducted in late 2011. In this article we'll look at member opinions about garden tours and the MGCM scholarship.

Tours

Members were clear about their preference among the two different types of club tour described. Two-thirds either agreed or strongly agreed that they preferred a club tour with

limited sites in close proximity to each other to allow a more leisurely visit of the sites and more social time with other members, while only a quarter preferred a club tour having multiple sites with limited time at each site so they could see as many gardens as they can. A vast majority (80%) favored adding a tour of renowned public or private garden tour to MGCM's summer schedule even if it means eliminating another tour. Just over half (55%) thought a progressive pot luck tour of two to four member gardens was a good idea, while just 41.7% favored a tour of the Arboretum. (Continued on next page.)

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Survey (Continued)

Members apparently like the public tours the way they are. Only 16% said that the public tour should be eliminated, while only 17% favored making the public tour become an annual event. 17% of respondents were in favor of eliminating tours altogether, as it can be difficult to get volunteers to open their gardens and/or manage the tours. However, more than half (55%) said they would be willing to open their garden to a club tour. Less than a third would be willing to host a public tour.

Scholarships

The MGCM scholarship program enjoyed wide support. 55% of respondents agreed or strongly agreed that it should be continued. Most (61%) think the current scholarship amount of \$500 is about right. (*Author's note: The majority can be wrong.* \$500 may only buy one semester's book these days. Larger, but fewer scholarships make better sense.)

Just over half (52%) think there should be fundraisers other than or in addition to public tours to support the scholarship program, although a significant number (41%) were neutral on this point. Members did not think doubling the dues to fund scholarships was a good idea. Only 16% agreed or strongly agreed. But, 54% said members should be encouraged to donate to the scholarship fund. 46% of survey takers said they would contribute between \$25 and \$50, while almost a quarter said they would contribute \$51 to \$100. That must be why Jan Johnson's scholarship challenge was so successful!

Other ideas for raising money for scholarships included opening the plant sale and auction to the public to raise more money, having special events like a fall bulb sale, seeking donations from gardening-related businesses, and selling ad space in *The Garden Spray* and on our website.

Another Member-Recommended Event: MNLA Garden Party at Home of Gordon Bailey, Jr.
