We have an excellent selection of small, medium, and large hostas including two more mini hostas from the mouse ears group. We again have ten each of The American Hosta Growers Association (AHGA), Hosta of the Year, H. 'Lakeside Paisley Print.'

This year for the first time, we have hostas from Rush Creek Growers, a local source. Use the links to the nurseries for more information.

In addition to these there will be other hostas of various sizes, colors, shapes and quantities. If anyone has hostas to donate for the sale, please contact <u>Steve Shubick</u>.

Prices for hostas will range from \$6.00 to \$16.00.


### 2019 Hosta of the Year H. 'Lakeside Paisley Print'

Medium 10"H x 20" W. This stunning hosta produces heart-shaped leaves with very wide, wavy, green margins. The narrow, creamy white markings in the center of the leaves shoot out from the

cream-colored petioles in a feathery pattern. Its thick leaves make the perfect background for the cream scapes that carry the light lavender flowers in midsummer. This hosta is good grower with great substance and is highly sought after. It stands out in any garden.



We will have five each of these hostas from Naylor Creek Hosta Nursery:



- H. 'Hands Up', Small, 8" H x 12" W. True tetraploid of H. 'Praying Hands' with lots of great attributes. Very thick, almost rubber-like leaves and a creamy-yellow to white border. Clump will be topped with lavender flowers. Good in a pot.
- H. 'Fire Island', Medium 15" H x 24" W. Requested again by members. Wide, stunning red petioles hold bright yellow to greenish-yellow ,wavy leaves. The medium sized mound has slightly wavy, corrugated leaves with deep maroon-red petioles.
- H. 'First Frost', Medium 14" H x 36" W. A medium size mound with thick foliage. In spring leaves are blue-green and yellow turning to dark green and white in midsummer. 2010 AHGA Hosta of the Year.
- H. 'Paisley Border' Medium 12" H x 30 " W. The reverse variegation of 'Lakeside Paisley Print'--dark green leaves have a fairly wide creamy-white border. Great substance and lots of style.
- H. 'Secret Treasure' Medium, 12" H x 25" W. H. 'One Man's Treasure' has been one of our favorites. H. 'Secret Treasure' with a nice wide white border, shiny dark green leaves and red petioles that show color well up into the leaf.
- H. 'Silver Bay', Medium 14" H x 38" W. Intense silver-blue leaves make a flat mound about 14" high. Leaves are quite round with some cupping and good corrugation. This Hosta should rank near the top of any list of best blue hostas.
- H. "Poker" Medium/Large, 14" H x 24" W. Fast-growing cultivar with slightly bluegreen foliage. Leaves are broadly ovate, lightly corrugated and dull on top.



- H. 'Guacamole', Large, 24" H x 54" W. Broadly ovate foliage has a chartreuse center that turns brighter as the season progresses. AHGA 2002 Hosta of the Year.
- H. 'Paradigm' Large, 22"H x 48" W. Blue-green with a cream margin and lavender flowers. 2007 AHGA Hosta of the Year.
- 10 each of these hostas will come from Rush Creek Growers:
- H. 'Sun Mouse', Mini, 6" H x 18" W. A gold version of 'Blue Mouse Ears.'
- H. 'Mighty Mouse' Mini 6" H x 19" W. Another very good sport from H. 'Blue Mouse Ears.' Starts out blue-green with a yellow border and later turns to grey-green with a white border.
- H. 'Curly Fries', Mini 5" H x 16" W. Gold, mounding, highly ruffled narrow leaves emerge yellow and fade to near white. Vigorous grower. 2016 AHGA Hosta of the Year.
- H. 'Rainbow's End', Small 10" H x 21" W. Extreme variegation and shiny leaves. The leaves with a bright yellow center and dark green margins. No two leaves look the same. In late summer, showy red scapes carry the dark lavender, tubular flowers.
- H. 'Pocket Full of Sunshine' Medium, 12" H x 20" W. Grows quickly into a compact clump of thick cupped yellow leaves framed with broad deep green borders. Leaves are thick and heavily puckered.
- H. 'Waterslide' Medium, 12" 15" H x 30" W. Thick blue leaves that are tightly rolled. Leaves look like water splashing in the shade garden and hold their blue color well. This one is going to be an all-time favorite.
- H. 'Island Breeze' Medium, 12" H x 18" W. Improved sport of 'Paradise Island' with wider margins and better leaf substance. Wide, dark green margins stand in sharp contrast to the bright yellow centers in early spring.
- H. 'Lakeside Paisley Print' Medium 10"H x 20" W. 2019 Hosta of the Year. See details above.

# Flower, Food & Foto Show Judy Berglund, Chair

## THIS YEAR'S FLORAL DESIGN THEME: "SONG TITLES WE LOVE"

Announcing the 2019 Floral Design Division Classes for the Flower, Food, and Foto Show on August 10 and 11. The design classes are as follows:

- 1. "It's a Small World" -- Miniature design less than 6"x6"x6"
- 2. "By the Light of the Silvery Moon" -- Floral design using white or cool colored blooms.
- 3. "Great Balls of Fire" -- Floral design using red or warm colored blooms.



- 4. "It Might as Well be Spring" -- Floral design using pastel colored blooms.
- 5. "Tapestry" -- Floral design using earth colors/natural colored blooms.
- 6. "Stairway to Heaven" -- A tall floral design.

The materials used in the designs need to be "garden grown" but do not need to all come from your garden. The materials you might find at a farmer's market are often garden grown by local farmers.

There are two classes for floral design:

Amateur - open to all who have won five or fewer first place awards in the design division of the flower show.

Advanced - open to all.

This division historically has had few entries, but last year's response was wonderful. So, get your creative juices flowing and keep up the great work with floral arrangements in this year's FFF Show.

### TIM ROSENER'S FLOWER PAINTINGS



inside scoop on the show and what's happening at Bachman's. If you haven't seen


the show yet, you still have time before the final day, Sunday, April 7.

It's officially spring, and I thought I'd send out the tentative plan for "the humps" at Lake Harriet (we need to find a better name). It may be hard to determine the species from this plan, but it will mainly be Diabolito® Ninebark, Sea of Gold® Juniper, Arctic willow, Neon Burst™ Dogwood, and sporobolus (prairie dropseed). Perennials might be subject to change and certainly subject to what's left in the grant (\$2,500).
