Gardens of Jerry & Lee Shannon 1847 Eleanor Avenue, St. Paul, MN 55116

The gardens of Jerry and Lee Shannon encompass two-thirds of an acre in the Highland Park area of St. Paul. The Shannon's are collectors of unusual woody and herbaceous plants. Jerry says they have over 95 different trees and shrubs. This great variety of plants are grown in sunny and shady perennial gardens, a dwarf conifer collection, a large rock garden, a cactus garden, a vegetable garden, a formal garden and a roof top garden. Search around and see how many you can identify!!

Numerous garden troughs feature diminutive alpine plants. Miniature hosta are featured in various locations. Sited under towering ash trees is a garden gazebo surrounded by shade loving hostas and wild flowers plus a gurgling water feature.

The Shannon gardens have been featured in the Northern Gardener, Better Homes and Garden Ideas and Outdoor living, and Midwest Home magazines. Their gardens have also been featured on the Home and Garden channel.

Reprint: Bob Olson on Having Your Garden on Tour (September 2005)

The garden tour committee asked if they could come to our garden for the evening tour this year. It is an honor (and an obligation) which you shouldn't turn down without a very good reason. But my wife asked me, "Why are they coming here again?" A good question. In the past twenty years our garden has been on tour for the MGCM seven times. We have 130 members in the MGCM and if you spread things out evenly the tour should have been here only once. And there are members who have been on tour more often than me. We keep visiting the same places. I like going to see fine gardens, but I also like learning a bit more about my friends in the garden club.

Over the years there has been a change in the character of the members-only evening garden tour. Fifteen years ago the evening tour was for small gardens; three of long-time MGCM members and one garden of a new member. Actually, the famous Smith Brothers tried to get two old timers, one somewhat-new member and a rookie for the evening tour (The Sunday afternoon tour, where member s brought guests, was for the heavy hitter gardens --those of Jerry Shannon, Dave Johnson, Stan Crist, Roger Koopmans and the like). I know, because in my first year in the club the evening tour came to my place. With brutal candor Russ Smith's brother Bob looked around my yard and said, "It won't be a long stop—and why don't you have some refreshments. There'll be enough time." I couldn't believe they would want to visit my house. I had some annuals by the back fence, four peonies that were done blooming and eight new hostas I had just planted. But the Smith brothers said that was the way the members get to know each other: they visit each other's gardens. So with that it was decided, my place would be on the tour.

I was as nervous as the mother-of-the-bride getting ready. But, the tour itself wasn't bad at all. These were my friends and they were out for an enjoyable evening of garden visiting. You would have to go way out of your way to keep them from having a good time. They didn't come to find fault, they came to discover neat things—some were things I wasn't aware of. Leon Snyder, the founder of the Arboretum, looked at my crab apple and told me matter-of-fact that it needed to be pruned, "and here's how you do it." Jerry Shannon helped me identify a plant whose label had been lost. Fred Glasoe admired my newly planted hostas and wanted to know where I got them. And no one said or noticed the weeds by the neighbor's garage. These were the people I had dinner with before the winter meetings and they had come to see my garden—and to learn a little more about me and what I was up to. The evening tour wasn't about having a series of show stopper landscaping masterpieces to admire; it was about getting to know your gardening friends. Somehow this philosophy has gradually been lost over the years. And it is our collective loss.

I would like to see it come back. I think it's OK to see a garden-in-progress. And some of our new members can gain some wonderful hints and helpful suggestions from the veteran gardeners. I believe that almost everyone in the club should have us stop by at some time during their membership. I propose that we return to the idea of trying to visit more members rather than recycling the "good gardens". What do others think?

Getting to Know Your Board Member: Jan Johnson



When Duane and I bought our first house in Richfield in 1959, it was a huge lot of sand burs. By carefully pulling out each one and burning them, by 1966 when we moved to Minneapolis, the lot was green grass and successful flower and vegetable gardens. Duane cut the grass.

Baby Brad came with attendant stuff and we decided that a bigger house was necessary. Again we bought a house that had not been lived in for a couple of years and needed some TLC. And again, I was the gardener in charge. Duane now cut the grass with a push mower.

In the early 80's Duane met Fred Glasoe who had lots of ideas about what we could/should do. About this time, I returned to teaching and went back to graduate school. We disagreed on what/how things needed to be done, and since I was busy with kids, school and teaching, I told him it was all his. Fred approved of Duane's garden and Duane joined MGCM in 1982.

In those days, wives were allowed only at the Holiday Party and on Club tours. As we were part of the Gardeners of America and a lawsuit mandated female membership, MGCM followed suit. When Duane became president in 1989, he took in the first two women – Mary Lerman (who objected to the club's name) and Mary Maynard. She's still around!

In 1994 I joined MGCM because I wanted to go to the GOA convention. A delegate to a convention could take time off without pay. It was eye-opening to hear experts from all over the country talk about gardening. I gave me pleasure to know that people all over the nation had similar joys and problems. Also, hearing talk of gardening 12 months, every year, made me glad I live in Minnesota and only have to work seven months of the year.

In 2002 we moved to a house that was landscaped with 3-foot borders, rock and little green mushrooms. Duane was still mowing the huge yard. I was too busy working on the inside and called Eldon Hugelen and said, "HELP"! He designed a wonderful plan and we implemented it late that summer. Duane dug holes and I planted. I wish I had known then what I know now about plant growth. It's time to sort of do it all over again. The straggling Forsythia will be replaced with the one I bought at the auction.

I took the Master Gardening training in 2005 in Douglas County. For the last seven years I've worked with Douglas County Habitat for Humanity clients on landscaping. Previously, HFH had landscaped with black plastic, rocks and a couple of trees. I haven't been able to convince them that Best Practices in landscaping is as important as in construction, so I've quit. Instead, I'm working with the AEON Corporation improving and maintaining the outside of a townhome on 28th and Portland Ave. AEON owns affordable apartments and townhomes. Both families have children and want to have a kitchen garden. I'm excited again.

Being secretary and attending Board meetings has given me much more insight into how much work there is keeping a vibrant organization running. I've enjoyed it thoroughly, especially becoming better acquainted with the members.





Board Meeting Minutes for May 2, 2011

Present: Kay Wolfe, Robert Kean, Sharla Aasang, Andy Marlow, Jason Rathe, Maury Lindblom, Don Untiedt.

The meeting was called to order at 7:45 by President Kay Wolfe.

Treasurer's report: Andy presented the year-to-date budget report. The report was received and filed.

President's report: President noted that all the committees are running well.

Vice President's report: Planning for June event going well. Dinner will be at Shamrock's in St. Paul with dessert and coffee in the gardens of Lee and Jerry Shannon, and Terrace Horticultural Books. September and November meeting presenters have been booked.
