### **Growing Tomatoes Part 2: Everything Else**

Note: Part 1 of Bob's article, which covered soil preparation and planting, appeared on Page 7 of the May Spray.

I only use slow release fertilizer, Osmocote, and two applications of fish emulsion with kelp. The plants love it. I use a hose end sprayer, and apply when the plants are 3-4 feet tall and the fruit has set.

Avoid watering the leaves and water in the morning.

Heirloom tomatoes ripen differently. Go by how they feel rather than their color. Pick them a day or two before they are fully ripe and watch carefully. The skins bruise easily.

I spray on a weekly basis, with Fung-Onit, a multipurpose fungicide.

If you see insects, use an appropriate spray or dust.

Sometimes I need to use a box trap for critters.

Watch the weather reports. If it rains, you can delay watering. If it is going to hail - pray!

Our tomatoes grew 7 to 8 feet tall. I do top them in late August.

Don't let fallen fruit sit around on the ground.

Buy good quality plants. It is better to put them out later rather than earlier.

Memorial plantings are to be "permanent plantings" of shrubs and trees. No memorial plantings were installed in Lyndale Park in 2010 or 2011. In 2012 memorial plantings included a *Picea abies* (Norway spruce) 'Hillside Upright' in memory of Howard Berg. A new memorial bed was planted with an

Aronia Melanocarpa, two Rosa 'Paint the Town,' two dwarf Japanese juniper, one 'Blue Nest' spruce, an upright 'Nova' yew, and a gold 'Sunburst' yew. And so far in 2013, we have planted a shade grouping of Viburnum 'Mohican,' an upright 'Nova' yew, a 'Green Mountain Pyramid' boxwood, and three round arborvitae—two 'Techny Globe' and one 'Little Giant.' The beds in front of the shrub groupings will be planted with annuals that have been donated by the Minneapolis Park Board. Stop by and see the garden!

### May 2013 Board Meeting Highlights

Highlights of the May Board meeting included reports from committees that have been active this spring:

- \*The Program Committee has scheduled activities and presentations for next year.
- \*The Tours Committee has confirmed tours in July and August to 5 gardens.
- \*The Marketing and Publicity Committee has produced a new brochure about the Club that will be available to share with potential new members, our Facebook site and website are being updated and improved, and inquiries are being made about possible award programs for which the Club may be eligible.
- \*The Arbor Day Committee has planned the annual celebration with the Audubon Society.

### 2013 Arbor Day Planting

On May 11, the Arbor Day committee of the Men's and Women's Garden Club of Minneapolis completed their annual planting event. This year's planting took place in Lyndale Park, near the entrance to Robert's Bird Sanctuary. The planting site borders the parking lot that services Robert's Sanctuary, The Lake Harriet Rose Garden, and the Peace Garden. The planting included over 30 native shrubs and small trees. Native perennials will be added later this year (by other volunteers). This site was recently cleared of buckthorn and weeds. The native plants will make the site more attractive in appearance as well as more favorable to birds. Hopefully, they will also suppress the re-growth of buckthorn at the site.





This project continues a partnership between the MWGCM and the Audubon Chapter of Minneapolis (ACM), which started last year with a planting in the sanctuary. This partnership has led to greatly increased available funding for plant materials and protective fencing. In addition to MWGCM and ACM, funds for this project were provided by the East Harriet Farmstead Neighborhood Association, the Linden Hills Neighborhood Council (pending) and a \$900 grant (obtained by ACM) from the Minnesota Ornithologists Union.

# Getting to Know Your Board Member: Margaret Hibberd, Co-Treasurer

My story is about the evolution of a gardener who learns many things from people and places along the way. I was born in Duluth, a beautiful place with a climate that prepares one to withstand many adverse situations. From my ages 7-17, my parents, brother and I lived in a home two blocks from the lake and a mile from our swimming hole in Lester River and eventually I did a lot of the yard work and learned to tend grass, peonies, lilacs, apple trees, shrub roses, and raspberries planted by the previous owner.

I graduated from East High School and went on to UMD where I studied in Zoology and Chemistry. After working at the Federal Water Lab in Duluth, I moved to St. Paul for graduate school in Genetics and met my husband, Ken, and we were married in 1969 during his first year in the Navy.

Ken came from a family of California gardeners, farmers, and ranchers, so we were soon gardening and visiting gardens in Homestead, Florida and Puerto Rico where he was stationed. During this time I worked at several things including the U of Fl. Subtropical Experimental Station working on eradicating Caribbean fruit flies and learning a lot about tropical fruits.

We returned to Minnesota for graduate school and lived in Lauderdale for 6 years, gardening, raising rabbits in the garage and working at the food co-op. During this time I slowly finished an M.S. Degree in Genetics and worked in the U of M Weed Research Lab, growing weeds and crop plants in the greenhouse to test the effects of Round-Up and Dicamba and took Horticulture and Agricultural Education courses and the first Master Gardener classes with the idea of becoming a County Agent.

Ken took his first position at Monsanto in St. Louis and after briefly working at Hummert's Horticulture Supply Company and Washington Univ. doing peanut tissue culture, I has hired as a Technical Librarian at Monsanto.

We bought a 1904 house and planted gardens, fruit tree, hollies, dogwoods and other things hardy in zone 6 gardens. One summer we had so many days over 100 that no tomatoes set fruit in that heat.

After 3 years Ken was hired by Molecular Genetics and we escaped back to Minnesota where I started working in the U of M Horticulture Dept. on lilies, beans, tissue culture, and managing the lab of 15 graduate students. I learned a lot of aspects of Horticulture and especially enjoyed the students and their friends. We had many fine pot luck meals with the different foods at our house and got to make many trips to Italy to visit former students after they returned home.

During this time I also worked part-time as a Patent Searcher in the library at 3M and after 6 years of this moved to 3M only in 1989, retiring in 2010.

In 1983 we bought the Falcon Heights house on its ¾ acre to do any kind of gardening we wanted and eventually had fewer opinionated expertise discussions if we divided our specialties. Ken got vegies, hostas, fruits trees, small fruits and I started growing perennial flowers along with annuals, kind of a life-long learning experience. I think lilies are still my favorite because they don't have to be dug like my favorite dahlias and cannas and now I've discovered the easiest gardening is planning my big pots and shopping for specialty annuals. But I have also enjoyed all the interactions I have meeting people as I tend my boulevard garden with its many tropical plants.

After attending the MGCM plant sales for several years as Mary Maynard's guest, she gave me a membership for my birthday in 1996. Soon I was recruited as a midseason Secretary replacement and on the Board learned a lot about the club and now I am the co-treasurer. I have enjoyed all the club activities and especially the people and all I have learned from them.
