It seems June has come and gone and as usual I still have quite a few plants to get in the

ground. Every year I set June 1 as my deadline to get everything planted, but between building and planting my two community garden vegetable plots, and dealing with what is the busiest time of the year at my job, I never make that goal. Then there are the sales at the garden centers this time of year that offer deals too good to pass up. So my collection of pots to plant gets smaller, and then it gets bigger. I'm hoping to be completely finished by the end of the July 4th weekend-we'll see.

This year my planting has taken longer than normal because I'm digging out and replanting a couple of large perennial beds. In the course of doing that I frequently uncover bits of plastic tags that once marked the location of long-gone plants--almost like an archeological dig--and they trigger memories of the time I've spent in my garden over the years. They also remind me of the mistakes I made, especially early on when I thought hybrid tea roses would thrive under my canopy of giant oak trees. Yet even my plant mistakes remind me of happy times. I can still recall standing in front of a display of delphiniums at Bachman's on a beautiful Saturday afternoon more than twenty years ago, trying to decide which variety to take home with me. As it turned out, I never could successfully grow delphiniums, but the memory of them lives on.

Sometimes the tags I find are from stores that also are no more, like Frank's, Lyndale Garden Center, and of course, Linder's. They provide a useful service too, reminding me that nothing is forever, and that I should savor every minute I spend in my garden, and the memories I'm growing there.

Here's to enjoying our gardens this summer--and NOT with trowel in hand!

## "BEE BUNDLES" IN THE NATIVE GARDEN

One of the goals of our Lyndale Park Native Garden is to support pollinators. This is also a special concern for the Park Board this year, and has been a frequent topic in the public discourse recently. We have probably all heard of colony collapse disorder, and threats to our bees and other pollinators because of our modern environment. In addition to choosing plants that provide good nutrition, and reducing use of pesticides, gardeners can help support our native bees by providing good nesting habitat.

There are about 4,000 species of native bees in North America, according to the Xerces Society, and around 30% of them are solitary nesters using hollow stems or holes in dead trees for laying their eggs.

In the Native Garden, one of the ways we have tried to help our pollinator friends is by leaving the native perennial stems standing last fall. Then, when cleaning the beds this spring, we cut the stems into lengths, tied them together in bundles, and placed them in out-of-the-way places in the garden. Native bees of many tunnel-nesting species will lay eggs in hollow stems like these.

The female bee will lay an egg, placing it together with collected pollen for the larva to feed on when it hatches. Then, before laying the next egg, she partitions the hollow stem with mud, leaf pieces, plant fiber, or other material (depending on the bee species), so that a series of individual cells lines the hollow stem, and each egg has its own "nursery."

We may never know if the local bees have found our "bee bundles," but we hope we've made a difference for them!

## NEW PLANTINGS AT LAKE NOKOMIS NATURESCAPE

Typically the MWGCM Arbor Day committee does one project each year focused on planting trees and/or shrubs. The plant material is selected in conjunction with any project partners. The club purchases and donates the plant materials up to the limit of our budget, and the committee plants them. Some years we also plant additional materials donated by our partners.

The project is usually done in the spring or early summer, but not on the actual designated Arbor Day, which is the last Friday in April. In recent years, the projects have all been in park areas near Lake Harriet. For the last four years, we have done plantings in and adjacent to the Roberts Bird Sanctuary. These were done in conjunction with the Audubon Chapter of Minneapolis, the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board, and the recently formed Friends of Roberts Bird Sanctuary. Before that, we did tree and shrub plantings in the Perennial

Trial and Border Garden in conjunction with the park board.

For 2016, the Arbor Day committee ventured further south. Our project was planned and conducted in collaboration with the Wild Ones Twin Cities Chapter with approval from the park board. The Wild Ones have been developing and maintaining a fouracre native plant area called the Naturescape on the east side of Lake Nokomis (the address is 5001 East Nokomis Parkway, Minneapolis 55417 if you want to Google Map it). They were looking to enhance their planting--primarily grasses and wildflowers--with native trees and shrubs, and got connected with our committee through a mutual acquaintance.

On May 21, our committee planted seven trees and shrubs, with help from a few Wild Ones volunteers. Given the high rabbit population in the area, we installed protective fencing around each plant. We encourage club members to take a look at the Naturescape. Look on the hillside (between Woodlawn and the parkway) for the new additions.

The plant materials were obtained from Out Back Nursery in Hasting. In an unexpected act of support and generosity, Out Back owner Tom Tennant gave us the plants at no charge (wholesale value of ~\$150), so we want to recognize Tom and Out Back for this donation to our club's efforts and the Naturescape. Many of you know that Bob and Mavis Voigt have a second home next door to Out Back, which has helped foster a long-term relationship between MWGCM and Out Back.
