Notes from the Prez

The Minnesota State Fair will soon be underway, which for me always marks the approaching end of the gardening season. It also represents a lot of activity by the Minnesota State Horticultural Society, which exhibits throughout all twelve days of the Fair. This year the theme of our educational display is "Tomato Mania", and along with information about growing tomatoes and the problems one can encounter with them, we will have tomato plants grown in fabric bags on display as well. I myself have been growing ten varieties of the bag tomatoes – two of each kind – at my community garden, and over the last few months this has proved to be an interesting experiment. They are mostly heirloom varieties, selected for their unusual colors, and we hope to show fairgoers varieties of tomatoes that many of them have never seen.

When I first planted the tomatoes in the bags, a number of my fellow community gardeners expressed doubt that they would do very well. Then as the plants took off and grew big and lush and began to tower over the bags, their skepticism shifted to how I was going to get them to the fairgrounds. (In a panel van, and the bags are so light I can carry each of them myself.) All summer long I've watched their progress with cautious optimism, and later with dismay as a few of them started to show signs of blight or blossom end rot. Now, with two days left before they travel to the fair, I think I will have enough decent looking plants with fruit on them to display, and I'll bring along one or two that show problems so people can see that side of it as well. If you're going to the Fair I hope you'll stop in at the Ag/Hort building to have a look.

Here's Laura's description of her presentation:

"One of Tangletown Gardens' largest clients is the Minneapolis Downtown Improvement District (DID), a non-profit entity that works to enhance the safety, commerce, and culture of a 120-block portion of downtown Minneapolis. Part of the DID's mission includes "greening," so Tangletown employees plant and maintain annual containers and perennial garden beds throughout downtown. This project includes both spring flower planting and winter greens installation, each of which involves months of planning and execution. This presentation will

discuss this process, including its challenges and effects on the broader

community."

Come and see the Lyndale Park Garden in its summer splendor. Before the September dinner meeting at Lakewood, from 5:00 to 6:00 PM, the Lyndale Park Garden Committee will be at the garden to greet you and answer any questions.

The garden is located at the intersection of Dupont Ave S. and Roseway Road, not far from the gate into Lakewood Cemetery. The best spots for parking are 1. On Dupont Avenue South. Going north there are bays for parking. This is the closest parking to the garden. 2. Peace Garden Parking Lot. Go west on Roseway Road and turn right into the parking lot next to the Peace Garden. Pay at the automatic pay station—or use the free permit that will be emailed to all members—and then walk east to the garden. For handicapped access, please pull over on Roseway Road by the garden and let the passenger out and then the driver can park. Members of the committee can assist if necessary.

We will have coleus ready for you to cut, pot and take home. Many of you did coleus cuttings last September and we hope you over-wintered them successfully and have beautiful coleus plantings in your containers and yards this year.

We have seven new and shorter varieties available for you this year. We will again have pots, potting soil, and scissors available for you to do the cuttings to take home. We'll provide printed directions so you know what to do all winter. Members of the Lyndale Park Garden Committee will be on hand to help you identify the coleus varieties and share with you their struggles and successes. We will be happy to problem solve with you about your experiences, so you can successfully over-winter these beautiful coleus.

Try your hand at over-wintering other annuals in the garden. You can take cuttings of 'Mahogany Splendor' hibiscus and several begonias including 'Jurassic Rex' and 'Aurora.'



True, due to earlier plantings, there are a few cultivars among the true natives, but they seem to blend and to attract pollinators very well.


A ninebark planted several years ago by those from the MWGCM working in the formal border to the east has been pruned and is looking less aggressive and more like a part of the garden.



The Chelone (turtlehead), Liatris (prairie blazingstar), Geum triflorum (prairie smoke), Asclepias (butterfly milkweed), Ruellia (wild petunia), and lots of others are taking hold and offering pollen and nectar to the bees, butterflies, and perhaps even some hummingbirds. Additional plants have been ordered to fill in some shady areas.

We invite you to stroll down to see what's going on at any time. We work most Wednesday mornings, and several of us will be present for the tour on Sept. 8 before the regular meeting, and we hope to see you there.
