

Bees, Wasps and other Pollinators

At the University of Minnesota, we're discovering solutions every day to protect bees, which in turn will help to protect our food supply and human health. The university plans to build two new facilities:

A new Bee and Pollinator Research Lab will be located on the St Paul campus, and a Bee and Pollinator Discovery Center, for the public, at the University of MN Landscape Arboretum.

Do you have "bees" living in structures in or around your house? With reason, many people confuse yellow jacket wasps, hornet wasps, and honey bees. If they are not bothering you, enjoy them -- or at least ignore them -- for our short summer season; the pesky wasps will be dead after two hard frosts.



Bees play a key role in the agricultural production and the beauty of our world through the pollination of fruits, vegetables, nuts, and flowers. The disruption of natural habitats leading to lack of "bee flowers," the widespread overuse of pesticides, and numerous bee diseases and parasites have pushed honey bees to the tipping point. This honey bee crisis is broadly termed Colony Collapse Disorder. Our native bees are also in decline due to unprecedented habitat loss, pesticide contamination, and their own diseases.

Bee Diversity

There are many different bees with varied behaviors and habits. About 3,500 bee species live in the United States, and in Minnesota, there are probably close to 400. Most of these are solitary bees, living in nests in the ground or in cavities in stems or trees. Hornets are another type of social wasp that builds their nest in a tree or other exposed area, as opposed to yellow jacket wasps that normally put their paper nest underground or inside a cavity. Hornets normally do not pester people, as do yellow jackets.

Honey Bees

Honey bees are one type of bee. They are orange-yellow or brown and black banded, and fuzzy. They are also social and the nest is constructed of beeswax.

- Honey bees nest in a beehive, a cavity of a tree, or sometimes in the wall of a house, where they can be seen flying in and out. They do not nest in a hole in the ground.
- Honey bees can sting only once and die after stinging.
- Honey bees form perennial colonies, meaning the entire colony of bees can survive the winter, clustering in the nest and producing heat by consuming stored honey.
- Honey bees are the only type of bee that collects large amounts of nectar from flowers to store in the nest as honey.

Pollination

More than one-third of the world's crop species such as alfalfa seed, sunflower, and numerous fruits and vegetables depend on bee pollination, an ecological service valued in North America at \$20 billion a year. While honey bees pollinate most of our crops, other bees are also important pollinators. Bees ensure sure garden plants, ornamentals, and wildflowers get adequate pollination.

Helping

You can help bees in four ways:

- 1. Plant bee flowers everywhere.
- 2. Provide nesting habitat.
- 3. Keep Bee-Flowers Clean: Do not treat bee-friendly flowers with pesticides (insecticides, fungicides or herbicides).
- 4. Support our efforts to keep bees healthy and on their own six feet.

Another way to support bees is if you find a swarm report it, don't spray the swarm. Below is a website about bee swarms and how to report a swarm. Do it when you see a swarm that has attached itself to an object since it may be gone in a day or two.
