Thanks to Susan Tapp for setting this in motion and getting the reporter to the garden to see the damage firsthand. By the time you read this a group of committee members will have attended and presented to the park board at its September meeting. The ongoing vandalism and destruction to the white pine trees, crabapple trees and various part of the native, shade and border gardens have distressed and angered committee members. Recommendations to the board included clearer demarcation of approved hammocking sites and stronger enforcement by park board police. To be continued.

Here are some of our newest members:

WELCOME LAURIE FREVERT

Laurie has spent most of her life in Minneapolis, except for 9 or 10 years in St. Paul. That's where she and her husband began growing vegetables, such as green beans, in her sunny apartment windows.

Laurie grew up surrounded by gardeners including her great-grandmother, her grandfather--who favored roses--and her father. Since her father's death last spring, Laurie has been maintaining the gardens at his home as well as her own. She found a pumpkin vine growing amid his hostas and hopes to keep the pumpkin she found on that vine until Halloween as a special memento from her father.

In addition, for the past 25 years she has worked with her family maintaining Arbor Garden, a community garden on Minnehaha Parkway. She also enjoys helping friends and neighbors garden. She has volunteered at the Friends' Plant Sale and at the State Fair Horticultural Building.

Her own garden is pollinator friendly. She has even replaced the ivy and ferns that once grew in her alley with a "pollinator patch." She doesn't grow vegetables at home however, since she lives close to Minnehaha Creek and the "critters" are too plentiful. She does grow dill, as she likes the look of it in bouquets, and almost always has some on her patio table.

WELCOME MARY NOLTE

Mary grew up in the small Minnesota town of Tremont where were 35 in her graduating class. Her father ran the town hardware store, and her mother was a dedicated gardener and president of the local garden club. One of Mary's early gardening memories is planting potatoes with her father and being amazed that a whole plant full of potatoes could grow from just a small piece.

In her current home in Minneapolis, Mary heard about grants available for homeowners starting rain gardens. She applied and received a grant, learning a great deal in the process. Her garden was on tour for three years as a demonstration rain garden. That led her to volunteer and take classes at the Arboretum. She also became a Certified Citizen Pruner, volunteering with pruning events led by Minneapolis Forestry.

Mary is a member of the Minnesota Herb Society, helps at the Arboretum herb garden and whips up herbal products like facial masks and foot scrubs. She is also a member of the Twin Cities Wild Ones and her entire front yard is native plants with a few legacy plants on the boulevard. This summer she has been thrilled to see a dozen or more monarch butterflies at a time enjoying her plants.

WELCOME SUSAN HOPP

Susan is originally from St. Anthony Park. After college she moved to Munich, Germany to study art and work in graphic design. After years in Germany, she felt the tug back to Minnesota. In 1990, she met her husband--also a graphic designer--in their graphic design association. He is the one who originally started filling in their yard with hostas and native plants when their large elm trees were lost. He slowly started eliminating the lawn area and encouraged Susan's gardening by building raised beds for her.

Susan is a cutting garden enthusiast and believes in bringing the garden inside. Her garden area is about one quarter native, and the rest is divided between annuals and perennials. She confessed she is not above pilfering a flower or two from her husband's area to fill out a bouquet.

Their garden was on the Tangletown Garden Tour this year. Susan said she was honored to be asked, but really had no idea what she was getting into. She needed to develop a new perspective toward her garden, striving for beauty with plants and blooms in their original places rather indoor arrangements. But even after a successful tour, she still favors the cutting garden.
